# **Useful Expression**

In today's scene, Sheldon says, I'd like to work with you on this, Sonny, not against you.

When a person or thing is working with you, that person or thing is helping you to do or accomplish something. They are cooperating with you.

When a person or thing is working against you, that person or thing is doing something to hinder you. In other words, they are interfering with your progress so that you do not accomplish the thing that you are working on.

We can use this expression in many ways and with many conditions: when talking about the weather, the odds of success/failure, a system, time, our bodies, the landscape/terrain, public opinion, technology, history, gravity, expectations, etc.

#### **Example**

- I want to finish painting my house this week, but the weather is working against me.
- If the weather keeps working with me, I'll finish painting my house in a day or two.
- I want my children to learn to love reading books, but technology is working against me.
- A lot of people think that A.I. will work with us to make the world a better place.

# **Today's Scene**

Prior to today's scene, the electricity to the bank was cut off. This means that Sonny, Sal, and their hostages don't have access to lights or air conditioning. They are hot and uncomfortable.

As today's scene begins, Sonny seems aggravated by his current circumstances and is quick to begin making demands. To his surprise, Detective Moretti, the man that Sonny had been negotiating with, has been replaced by an FBI agent named Sheldon.

Let's see how Sheldon handles Sonny and the hostage situation differently than Moretti did.







### **Role Play**

Today's dialogue is mostly between Sonny and Sheldon. There are, however, three other characters that have lines. I think today's role play will work well if the person playing Sonny also says the lines for Sylvia, the Woman, and Sal.

As you are reading the lines for today's scene, remember to try to speak like the actors do in the movie. Sonny is loud, demanding, and slightly violent. Sheldon is very calm and soothing. See if you can convey these characteristics while playing each of these characters.

### **Conversation**

In today's scene, Sheldon says to Sonny, You handled yourself real well, Sonny. A lot of men would have choked.

The expression to choke means to buckle or give into pressure. Many athletes choke in championship games, which is to say that they don't play as well as they usually do because of being nervous.

If you choke on an exam, that means that you were prepared for the exam, but you didn't do well on it because you were too nervous.

### **Examples:**

- I planned to ask Christine out the other day, but I choked.
- I went to a job interview yesterday, and I completely choked.
- I choked during the presentation this morning.
- etc.

#### Question

Is there a time in your life when you choked under pressure? If so, tell your partner about it.

If nothing comes to mind, can you think of a moment when somebody you know choked under the pressure of a particular situation, or when a famous athlete choked in a big game? Be sure to include as many details as you can.
